Free Fire Permits

The Ontario Fire Code (2.6.2.4.) prohibits all open air burning except for small confined cooking fires and other fires that have been "approved" by the Fire Chief. This article describes the policy by which limited open air burning may be permitted.

Open Air Burning Includes

Any fire set outside, other than on a small confined grill, while being used to cook food. Campfires, brush/leaves, burn barrels and construction site fires are examples of open air burning.

Do you know that Open Air Burning requires a permit from the Fire Chief? The fire can't be any larger than 1.2 metres x 1.2 metres x 1.2 metres (4 ft. x 4 ft. x 4 ft). You must have a minimum of 7 metres (23 ft) clearance from any structure, hedge, fence or anything combustible.

You must stay with the fire at all times until it is completely extinguished, and you must provide a means of extinguishment.

Be mindful of your neighbour. You can not maintain a fire when the direction of the wind may cause either reduced visibility on a roadway or excessive smoke or an odour that may cause discomfort to persons in the immediate area and the fire must be out by sunset.

Obtaining Permission to Burn

Permits for Open Air Burning can be obtained from the Civic Centre or at Station 1-4 in Keswick at 165 The Queensway South, Keswick, 905-476-5167 or Station 1-6 at 37 Snooks Blvd. Sutton, 905-722-8252 Remember, if the Fire department is called and no authorization has been obtained, you are liable to pay costs for the Fire department and/or charged under the Open Air Burning Bylaw, or both. Regardless of authorization, the person that starts the fire is responsible for any effect that fire or smoke may have on neighbouring persons or property.

Boating Pre-departure Checklist

Personal and Environmental Planning:

Check the local weather forecast. Review marine charts or maps of the area to determine and mark local hazards. Consider the seasonal changes of the area. Talk with local boaters concerning hazards especially if no marine charts are available. Complete a trip plan and leave it with a responsible individual.

Preparation:

Inspect the craft, repair damage and tighten loose fittings.

Review emergency procedures and practice skills.

Review each passenger's responsibilities before boarding.

Show everyone where the equipment is stored and ensure required equipment is easily accessible.

Equipment:

Ensure all required safety equipment is on board and is in good working condition. Have enough approved flotation devices of the correct size for everyone on board.

Have the required and recommended safety equipment. This could include a first aid kit, repair kit, spare parts, necessary tools and survival rations.

Have enough fuel for the trip. Follow the rule of thirds when planning your fuel consumption, 1/3 to reach your destination, 1/3 to return and 1/3 for reserve. Have a means of communication like a cellphone or VHF radio. Make sure everyone on board has the appropriate clothing for protection from the weather.

Keeping the Family in the Family Cottage

How to plan for cottage succession for future generations despite the multiple financial hurdles and inevitable family issues.

Succession Stumbling Blocks

The current ownership generation is approaching or past retirement age. Discretionary income available for cottage expenses are decreasing, at the same time that cottage ownership costs (taxes, utilities, compliance with environmental regulations, septic system upgrades, maintenance, repairs) are increasing. Financial planning and prioritization of resources is critical to enable this generation of owners to afford to retain the cottage for the next generation.

The successor generation is challenged by the economic downturn and are less able to afford to buy a new cottage or afford sole ownership of any cottage property. For many, the only viable cottage opportunity for themselves and their children is to preserve the existing cottage in the family, sharing the usage and costs with siblings and other family members. Family cottages shared by multiple sibling families can cause inevitable friction, differences and disputes, for any family, putting the continued survival of the family cottage at risk following the succession.

Paying the Capital Gains Tax

The first challenge in changing the ownership of a cottage is the capital gains tax. This must be paid when the cottage is sold or transferred, during the parents' lifetime or after their death. Although the federal government recently reduced the impact of this tax, it can still cost tens of thousands of dollars, and many families are forced to sell the cottage as a result.

Keeping the Cottage Going

The second challenge is working out how the children will agree to use and operate the cottage. Among the questions to be answered are: Can any child use the cottage any time, or will there be periods of exclusive use? Who will open and close the cottage? Who makes sure the bills are paid? Who decides if improvements or additions are to be made? When a son dies, does his share of the cottage pass to his wife or his children, or does ownership continue with the surviving siblings only. Without good answers to these questions, many cottages become a source of family strife, not pleasure.

Managing Expenses

The third challenge involves the children's financial status. Usually siblings have different financial resources and abilities. Expenses are inevitable, whether it's replacing the septic system, paying the municipal taxes or repairing the roof. If some of the kids can't afford to contribute their fair share, then friction and stress are also inevitable.

Ontario's Fish Stocking Program

Fish culture and stocking have a long history in Ontario. The earliest fish culture efforts in Ontario started with Samuel Wilmot who began rearing Atlantic salmon at a small facility near Newcastle, in 1865.

Today, the Ontario Ministry of Natural Resources operates nine provincial fish culture stations that produce approximately 8 million fish for stocking in public waters each year.

About 50% of these fish are intended to provide additional fishing opportunities through put-grow-and-take stocking. The remaining 50% are used to rehabilitate degraded fisheries. For example, the majority of lake trout stocked in the Great Lakes are intended to restore populations that were destroyed by sea lamprey predation and overfishing in the 1950s.

Legal & Common Sense

We extend a warm welcome to all who have made McRae Beach their permanent or summer address since the 2012 season. As a reminder to those of us who have been around for some time and FYI to our new arrivals:

- Georgina Township requires dogs to be leashed or otherwise restrained at all times.
- Parking and camping within our parks are prohibited.
- Use of our parks is restricted to McRae Beach residents and their guests only.
- The speed limit on Blue Heron Drive, McRae Beach South and all side streets is 40km/h.
- When on/in the water PLAY SAFELY! Swimmers and sailboats always have the right of way.
- All docks, boat lifts, etc. are to be out of the parks and in the water, or on your own property by June 10. This will assist the grass cutter to do his job and park users to pursue their enjoyment of this space.
- For safety reasons and the pleasure of all, no vehicles are to be left in the parks. Please park along the road or return your car to your dwelling after launching.
- The first 30 meters (100ish feet) from the shoreline are deemed restricted and as such boats and PWC operators are reminded of the need to keep their speed down to 10km/hr when entering or exiting this area. Many residents have placed buoys at the 100' mark to assist in identifying the swimming area.
